Quantitative Statement of Need to Replace Facility	The new Indio Juvenile and Family Law Courthouse project was ranked in the Immediate Need priority group by the AOC due to many security deficiencies that continue to be of great concern as the court operates the current facility. The courthouse has a security rating of 80, which is the highest possible rating for deficiencies. Critical security concerns include: the substandard security screening equipment caused by a lack of lobby space; non-secured judicial parking that is accessible to the public; in-custody waiting areas located in a restricted corridor used by judicial officers; and a non-secure office off of the public corridor used for adult holding. Additional deficiencies in the building include many substandard sized spaces and overcrowding from the volume of customers served in the desert region. Both juvenile courtrooms are significantly undersized for the volume of cases heard and they do not meet current AOC design standards. The lobby and main public corridors are also undersized and do not allow all who are waiting to enter the building immediately upon arrival. This creates a health concern as the average temperature during the day in Indio is 89 degrees and temperatures range between 102 and 119 degrees during the summer months. The new Indio Juvenile and Family Law Courthouse project is considered the most critical need project for the Riverside County Superior Court.

	The court has already started discussions with the PAG to reduce the overall square footage of the project by at least 10 percent. Square footage and savings may be gained by removing three of the five jury boxes from the family law / dependency courtrooms that have been designed as multi-functional courtooms for future jury trial use. Additional savings may be found by reducing the AOC Trial Court Facility standards where they do not effect the overall safety or security of the new building. The PAG is also willing to consider the effective implementation of lower-cost construction methods, such as tilt up construction for additional savings.

1. Security	The current facility has a number of security problems, including: • The building has no central security control room. • There is not a secure path of circulation separating judicial officers and staff from incustody defendants in the restricted corridor. • The circulation path from the central holding area is a convoluted route through several rooms and corridors created by multiple building additions.
2. Overcrowding	 The current Hemet courthouse is overcrowded, as shown by: A small and outdated jury assembly room has been converted to a cramped Family Law Assistance Center (FLAC). The setup of the room makes it difficult for the facilitator and other court staff to have confidential meetings with litigants. The courthouse main entrance has enough room for only one security screening station, which creates problems when over 1,000 people enter the courthouse each day. This becomes even worse with the average summer temperatures ranging between 95 and 106 degrees and people are unable to enter the building. Because of a lack of space, the court was forced to relocate the enhanced collections division (ECD) staff to another courthouse. Customers wishing to set up payment plans or discuss their financial obligations to the court must make contact with ECD telephonically or travel to another courthouse. The entrance to the courtroom that hears general civil, unlawful detainers, small claims, civil harassments, and traffic cases is situated adjacent to the public service windows for the civil department. The lack of space means crowds of people gather outside of the courtroom, creating chaos while waiting for court to start or for service at the counters.

3. Physical Condition	 The courthouse is too small to support the operational needs of the court and the need for additional civil court services. The building has had two separate additions that have created awkward and confusing circulation for both the public and staff and are not fully ADA compliant. The building has an undersized entrance screening queuing and lobby area, resulting in lines extending outside the building on a regular basis. The remaining public lobby space beyond the court screening magnetometer is small and confined. Due to the constrained lobby configuration, security is unable to monitor public service windows as they are physically out of view, creating the need for additional roving security. 	
4. Access to Court Services	The proposed project will improve access to court services for court users. There are currently limited court services for the residents of mid-Riverside County at the existing Hemet Courthouse. The existing courthouse houses five courtrooms serving civil, small claims, family law, probate and traffic cases, and is physically deficient, substandard in size, and overcrowded. The facility lacks secure circulation and an adequate holding facility and does not accommodate criminal trials.	
5. Economic Opportunity	There are a number of options that the developer for one of the possible sites will consider to move this project forward. If the AOC decides to pursue the originally approved direction, the developer is willing to sell the land at 50 percent of market value. The developer is also willing to proceed with a "build to suit / lease option" if the AOC prefers not to purchase the land or own the building.
