Subject: AB 225 (Beall), as amended May 21, 2008 - Support

Hearing: Senate Judiciary Committee - June 10, 2008

Dear Senator Corbett:

The Judicial Council supports AB 225, which re-enacts, as of January 1, 2010, the elder abuse protective orders statute, and expands its scope to: (1) allow the court, in its discretion, on a showing of good cause, to extend the protection to include the petitioner's named family or household members, as well as the petitioner's conservator; and, (2) provide that when a person named in a protective order has not been served personally with the order but has received actual notice of the existence and substance of the order through personal appearance in court to hear the terms of the order from the court, no additional proof of service is required for enforcement of the order. AB 225 also provides that a petitioner shall not be required to pay a fee for law enforcement to serve a protective order issued pursuant to the bill's provisions.

The Judicial Council supports the changes in AB 225, which are consistent with similar provisions of the Domestic Violence Prevention Act. Family Code section 6320 allows the court to protect other family and household members when it finds good cause to do so, and Family Code section 6384 mirrors the proof of service provisions contained in AB 225. These changes will enhance the ability of the court to issue enforceable and effective elder abuse protective

orders by ensuring that the orders protect all members of the protected person's household or family as necessary, including conservators. AB 225 also clarifies what is required to demonstrate proof of service of an order so that enforcement can commence immediately if the parties were present at the hearing on the order, or allow service by mail of the order after hearing if its terms are identical to the temporary restraining order.

Enhancing consistency across protective order requirements will improve public understanding of this critical area of the law, and bolster public trust and confidence in the courts by ensuring that similar case types are handled similarly by the court.

For these reasons, the Judicial Council supports AB 225.

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:
