##### **Item 1**

##### **Family Law: Domestic Violence Form Changes to Implement New Laws**

This proposal implements new laws related to body arm (AB 92) and child custody and visitation (SB 599).

##### **Item 2**

##### **Family Law: Changes to child custody forms and Standard of Judicial Administration Under Senate Bill 599**

The proposal would implement Senate Bill 599 by amending one Standard of Judicial Administration relating to supervised visitation, approving a new information sheet to include the new statutory definition of virtual visitation, and revising three forms relating to child custody and visitation (parenting time) for cases involving allegations of a parent or parents' history of abuse or substance abuse under Family Code section 3011.

##### **Item 3**

##### **Domestic Violence and Family Law: Changes to Rule and Forms to Implement Senate Bill 459**

This proposal implements SB 459, which requires the Judicial Council to create one or more specific forms for the purpose of requesting a modification of an existing domestic violence restraining order.

**Item 4**

**Juvenile Law: Juvenile Restraining Orders**

This proposal would adopt one and amend three rules of the California Rules of Court, approve one new form, amend ten forms, and revoke one form to conform to recent statutory changes enacted by Assembly Bill 1621 (Gipson; Stats. 2022, ch. 76) which redefines “firearm precursor parts” and Assembly Bill 92 (Stats. 2023, ch. 232) which specifies that a person who is prohibited from possessing firearms is also prohibited from possessing, owning, or buying body armor, and to create a new notice of hearing form that is separate from the temporary restraining order forms.
